Annual Concert **MERAKI** A DISPLAY OF PASSION






Diplomathon 2023

Is the 'Bletchley Declaration' sufficient to guarantee the safe and responsible development and deployment of 'Digital Super Intelligence' globally?

We stand at the apex of an eon where digital superintelligence promises unrivalled feats and possibilities for society. The advent of artificial intelligence has paved the way for a revolution that will reshape every aspect of our lives. The 'Bletchley Declaration' signifies such a critical step forward in this journey, outlining principles and guidelines aimed at fostering an environment where innovation harmonises with ethical considerations.

On November 1 and 2, 2023, 28 countries, along with the European Union, France, Japan, and India, attended the world's first AI Safety Summit in the historically resonant setting of Bletchley Park. The Bletchley Declaration is the first AI safety and regulation pact to ever be framed. This declaration indicates that the "delineation, development, deployment, and use of AI should be performed in a manner that is human-centric." It constituted the genesis of extended international cooperation on AI safety, with the next summit already planned for 2024 in France.

Kupinger Cole-Cyberrevolution calls this declaration 'The Imitation Game of a Different Kind'. Being the first-ever pact of its kind, this declaration answers all the questions and risks that countries around the world are trying to face head-on. Most powers around the world decided on a relevant initiative to promote the safe use of AI and the basic purpose of this international forum-to guarantee the safe development and deployment of 'Digital Super Intelligence' globally.

Rishi Sunak, the Indian-origin British Prime Minister, called this declaration "a landmark achievement... helping ensure the long-term future of our children and grandchildren." Keeping with the Prime Minister's expression of AI, during the summit, the signatories to the Bletchley Declaration agreed that it is important to consider "a pro-innovation and proportionate governance and regulatory approach" that achieves the balance between AI benefits and risks. In addition to the fact that the Bletchley Declaration ensures the safety and security of and from AI, it also clinches on more scientific research on frontier AI. The signatories to this declaration not only concurred on the significance of extensions in technology and AI but also highlighted the concerns that this advancement might bring, which are all addressed in this memorandum.

In a video message played during the summit, King Charles III of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland described AI as "one of the greatest technological leaps in the history of human endeavor." The King further added, "That is how the international community has sought to tackle climate change, light a path to net zero, and safeguard the future of our planet. We must similarly address the risks presented by AI with a sense of urgency, unity, and collective strength." Aside from the King, Elon Reeve Musk, who also attended the AI Safety Summit, said in an interview on Wednesday, November 1, 2023, that the UK wants to establish a 'third party referee' with the Bletchley Declaration that could oversee companies developing artificial intelligence and sound the alarm if they have concerns. This ably answers the question of the relevance of the Bletchley Declaration.

The Bletchley Declaration serves as a valuable asset for policymakers, researchers, and stakeholders in navigating the convolutions of AI while also promoting responsible and ethical development in this rapidly expanding technological landscape. To conclude, yes, the 'Bletchley Declaration' is sufficient to guarantee the safe and responsible development and deployment of 'Digital Super Intelligence' globally.

The Bletchley Declaration is a set of ethical principles aimed at guiding the development and deployment of Digital Super Intelligence (DSI) globally. It was drafted by a group of eminent experts in the field of artificial intelligence and was unveiled at the Bletchley Park Institute for the Study of AI. The declaration seeks to address the potential risks and challenges associated with the development of DSI while maximising its potential benefits. However, it is not sufficient to guarantee the safe and responsible development and deployment of DSI globally for the following reasons:

Firstly, the Bletchley Declaration is not legally binding. It is a voluntary agreement that relies on cooperation and voluntary compliance from all stakeholders involved in the development and deployment of DSI. This means that there is no legal support or enforcement mechanism in place to hold individuals or organisations accountable if they violate the principles outlined in the declaration. In today's highly competitive market, some companies may prioritise their own interests and goals over ethical considerations, which could lead to the development and deployment of DSI with potential risks and consequences.

Secondly, the Bletchley Declaration is limited in its scope. It mainly focuses on the ethical principles for the development and deployment of DSI, such as transparency, safety, and accountability. While these are crucial aspects, the declaration fails to address broader issues such as the economic, political, and social implications of DSI. For example, the widespread adoption of DSI could have a significant impact on employment opportunities, inequality, and power dynamics between different countries and societies. Without addressing these issues, the Bletchley Declaration may not be sufficient to ensure the responsible development and deployment of DSI globally.

Thirdly, the Bletchley Declaration lacks a clear mechanism for implementation and oversight. While the declaration suggests the creation of an independent oversight body, there is no concrete plan for its establishment or how it will function. It is essential to have a robust oversight mechanism in place to monitor the development and deployment of DSI and ensure compliance with ethical principles. Without such a mechanism, the effectiveness of the declaration in promoting responsible development and deployment of DSI may be limited.

Furthermore, the Bletchley Declaration does not account for the rapidly evolving nature of DSI. As technology advances and new capabilities emerge, ethical considerations surrounding DSI may also evolve. This means that the declaration may become outdated and ineffective in addressing emerging ethical challenges. The safe and responsible development of DSI globally should be through a continuous and dynamic process of evaluating and updating ethical principles.

Finally, the Bletchley Declaration lacks a framework for international cooperation and coordination. DSI is a global phenomenon, and its development and deployment have significant implications for all countries. However, the declaration does not provide a roadmap for international cooperation and coordination based on ethical principles. This could lead to divergent approaches and standards in different countries, which may undermine the effectiveness of the declaration in promoting responsible development and deployment of DSI globally.

In conclusion, while the Bletchley Declaration provides a foundation for ethical considerations in DSI development, it is not a standalone solution. A holistic approach involving dynamic regulatory frameworks, ongoing ethical considerations, transparency, accountability, and global collaboration is necessary to address the multifaceted challenges posed by Digital Super Intelligence. The declaration serves as a starting point, but sustained efforts are required to navigate the complex landscape of DSI responsibly.

Our lives are made up of many different moments




and experiences that add beauty, meaning, and richness to them. Even though some experiences can be seen as insignificant, they can have a big impact on the final result.



Mike immediately clicked the registration button and then filled in the details. Almost instantly, he received the message that said "Your registration was successful."


Two months later:







Tête-à-Tête with Justice Madan Bhimarao Lokur



Supreme Court, Fiji, Ex-Judge,
Supreme Court of India

Q After your retirement as a judge in the Supreme Court of India, you became a judge on the non-resident panel of the Supreme Court of Fiji. Being the first Indian judge to serve in a foreign country is remarkable. How does it feel to represent India in an international legal setting, and how important do you consider this milestone in your career?

Excerpts from the Interview

Being appointed as a judge by the Fijian Supreme Court is an honour for me and the nation as a whole. Since Fiji and India are commonwealth nations with a similar history, their judicial systems are essentially the same.

Fiji is a small nation made up of two main islands, and has a population of about 10–12 lakh. Hence, the volume of cases in Fiji's courts is quite low as compared to India. In contrast to India, the Supreme Court there does not sit daily, just three times in a year. April is the first of three sessions; August is the second, and October is the third. I have the freedom of attending the session of my choosing.

Since I work for the Supreme Court, I do not get many cases, however, the entire month is devoted to these sessions wherein I hear the appeals but there are no trials.

Q You first enrolled as an advocate in 1977 and retired from the Apex Court in 2018. After being a part of the Indian Judicial System for so long, witnessing its expansion and development, what improvements have you come across that once seemed like a distant future?

There have been several changes that have come about such as the introduction of mediation as a method of resolving disputes. It was Judge Lahoti who initiated this. As was mentioned in my introduction, I was a member of the committee for mediation and conciliation. The concept was to establish "Court Annexed Mediation," in which matters that are still ongoing in court might be sent for mediation and settled by a court-appointed mediator. Due to our success, we were able to expand this to Bengaluru, Chennai, Mumbai, and many other cities by using the District Court in Delhi as our base for appeals. Mediation has a re-enacted legal framework and is currently conducted virtually.

Moreover, since the Lok Adalat System's introduction, the minor cases that would have taken precious time from the court are now being resolved at a lower level to the satisfaction of both the parties involved. The Lok Adalat is open to membership by anybody. When I went to my first Lok Adalat, I was a lawyer. After both sides presented their claims, we were expected to give a decision. This system has been used to resolve lakhs of cases. Furthermore, the establishment of Public Interest Litigation because of which as per The Supreme Court any citizen of India can write to the Chief Justice of India a letter outlining their grievance. Justice Lahoti, a retired judge, wrote a letter to me while I was on the Social Justice Bench stating that we needed to look into the terrible conditions in jails. As a result of this PIL, the issue was highlighted and reforms were made.

Technology too, has brought about a sea change in our vision of courts. When I was Chairperson of the e-committee, we introduced computers and installed video conferencing systems in every court of the country. This allowed courts to continue functioning even during the pandemic. Now live streams of proceedings are available in the Supreme Court and multiple High Courts.

Our perception of courts has drastically changed as a result of the introduction of technology in court procedures.

Q Given your interest in judicial reforms and the computerization of courts, what advancements do you believe are crucial for the Indian legal system?

I advocate prioritizing case management as a crucial measure to address the persistent issue of delays in our court systems. Although Justice M. Jagannath Rao, the former chair of the Law Commission, suggested case management guidelines which the Apex Court has approved; however, the Supreme Court and other courts have not yet implemented them. Effective court administration is imperative to expedite the resolutions quickly and cutting down on the amount of time it takes to deliver judgements. Plea bargaining in criminal trials and mediation in civil proceedings are equally essential. We successfully used these techniques to some extent in Delhi's district courts, albeit not widely. Plea negotiation can significantly improve cases, particularly those involving minor criminal offences.

During my tenure with the e-committee, we introduced virtual courts to address the pervasive issue of traffic offences in Delhi. Offenders could visit

the website, plead guilty, and pay the minimum fine online. This streamlined the process and alleviated the burden on magistrates dealing exclusively with traffic violations. The success of this initiative led to its adoption in other locations. Expanding on this concept, I propose applying virtual courts to handle petty offences, such as delayed or unpaid property taxes. Online resolution of such cases would significantly enhance efficiency and contribute to expeditious justice. These innovations, if embraced, have the potential to bring about a transformative impact on our legal system, promoting swifter and more accessible justice.

Q Your bench earned the "Social Justice Bench" moniker for your penchant for social justice cases. Was there something specific that drew you to these particular kinds of cases?

Social Justice, established at my behest, addresses the non-implementation of Public Interest litigation despite court orders. To oversee these orders, I suggested creating a monitoring system and taking control of it. Various cases within the realm of society prompted our involvement. The 'Mahatma Gandhi National Employment Scheme' fell short due to inadequate supervision, leading to delays in work and payments. By addressing this

problem, we made sure the program and the Food Security Commission would succeed. The intervention was required because minimum wage workers in the construction industry lost out on up to Rs. 25 crores. The spectrum of cases, including Juvenile Justice, revealed deplorable conditions in children's homes which violated their rights.

We made suggestions for enhancements and urged the administration to update prison facilities as a national model. Our efforts serve as a social regulatory framework in areas where laws were either non-existent or ineffectively applied, such as in jails. Such social justice initiatives have yielded positive and gratifying outcomes

Q What is the impact of legal proceedings on the lives of juveniles, and what measures can be taken to ensure their overall well-being during the legal process?

The horrific Nirbhaya case, predates the effective implementation of the Juvenile Justice Act, which we, as the Social Justice Bench, have taken charge of. The Juvenile Justice Act drew attention to crimes committed by children. Despite the Act's focus on reforming the child, the Social Justice Bench believes that the emphasis should be on allowing self-reformation and societal reintegration of the juveniles. During my visits to observation rooms in Bhopal and Delhi, I observed subpar conditions which hindered the improvement and penitence of these accused children. Our challenge is to nurture these children into responsible citizens.

In the Social Justice Bench, we take proactive measures for their upliftment and rehabilitation. In order to address the offence, cases of illegal overcrowding in Delhi residences were corrected, bringing the total down from 258 to 48. The Juvenile Justice Board must prioritize the welfare of children, especially those escaping domestic violence or resorting to begging. Child Welfare Committees, established under the Juvenile Justice Act, play a crucial role in caring for these children. Even after I retire, I will remain committed to the proper care of juveniles as I recognize the importance of their integration into society and restoration to their families when feasible.

Q Do you believe that the increasing adoption of ADR mechanisms, such as mediation and arbitration, by companies has significantly contributed to alleviating the burden on traditional courts in India, given the substantial backlog of cases? Alternatively, do you see a trend where ADR is often a precursor to resorting to traditional courts if an amicable solution is not achieved, thus indirectly adding to the workload of the judiciary?

Mediation, arbitration, and other alternate resolution systems haven't reduced the case backlog significantly. In Delhi District Courts, only about 3 lakh cases are resolved through mediation. People choose arbitration for faster resolution, but decisions can be challenged in court. Despite the availability of alternate forums, cases often return to court, making little difference.

Institutionalizing mediation can reduce the burden on courts. Dysfunctional Gram Nyayalayas and ineffective systems have contributed to the backlogs. We're dealing with a backlog of 50 million cases. Fast-track courts for children's cases aim for 165 annual decisions, but the average is merely twenty-eight. Court management is crucial to address this problem.
